

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

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at last determined to sell both cargo and vessel. No sooner was the sale advertised, than one of the mates came forward, and under oath, declared that both vessel and cargo were owned by Don Pedro Blanco, one of the principal slave-traders at Gallinas, that she was a regular slaver, and came on the coast solely for that purpose. The sailors confirmed his testimony. Governor Buchanan immediately ordered a writ to be served; the property was seized, while the captain disappeared in the night, and made his way back again to his employer.

Have you heard of the sturdy bravery of those British seamen, who shipped on board a vessel engaged in the African trade, and on arriving at Gallinas, learned for the first time, that they were to take a cargo of slaves? Disgusted with a traffic condemned by every Christian nation, and indignant at being deceived into it, they resolved to bear no part or lot in the matter. One day, while the captain was absent on shore, the crew weighed anchor and put to sea. They carried her to Sierra Leone, and gave her up to the authorities of that colony.


Frequent mention has been made of King Boatswain, a powerful chief, and one of the greatest slave-dealers in the region. He was a most extraordinary African. When young, he visited England, and served for a time in a British man-of-war. Afterwards returning to his own country, he plunged

into the interior, 50 miles from Cape Mesurado, and set up his standard. Of giant stature and unconquerable energy, he soon drew about him all the high bloods of the country. War was his business; his generals became the most noted warriors of the age; few tribes could long withstand their artifices or attacks. But King Boatswain, with an almost instinctive reverence for civilization, had always been a faithful friend to the Liberians. In fact, he was their most powerful ally, whose protection had been of service to them, more than once in overawing the turbulent spirits of some of their nearer neighbours.

His death proved the occasion of serious troubles. Gatumba, a bold and bloody chief, succeeded to the kingdom, while Goterah, a noted warrior, became commander of his forces.

The tribes around soon felt the weight of their power; they waged war in every direction, for the purpose of making captives, to supply the demands of the slave-trade; and at length they had entered the Dey country, a region bordering on Liberia. Thousands of unhappy Deys were butchered, or carried away and sold into hopeless slavery, when a poor, miserable remnant of the tribe, about 20 in number, came to the people of Millsburg, begging the protection of the Liberian government, and permission to settle quietly down among the colonists. They were kindly received. The people set about

to instruct them in the arts of civilized life, and for knew not how relentless are the demands of the ears, for they now considered themselves beyond the as happy as could be. No fear of captivity haunted peaceable and pleasant homes. The poor Deys were the first time in their lives, they began to enjoy them, nor did the chains of slavery clank in their mainder. 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

Continuing our rapid career for three or four miles, we came to guinea grass; among which grew a few trees, called here "monkey bread," (the giant boabob,) with scanty foliage, as if a tornado had swept off their upper branches, and with stems swollen and bloated like a leg with elephantiasis. Small finches flew up from the grass; and turkeybuzzards sailed in mid-air. A ridge of sand, as if heaped up by the wind from the beach, the vicinity of which was announced by the hollow roar of the breakers, showed that we were near dwellings: for it was covered with the high stalks of Indian corn, creeping sweet potatoes, and ochras; whilst a negro smoked his short pipe as he plied his light labour among the weeds. The village of Melville consisted of one street, with light fences of branches on each side, over which appeared the long stems of maize. Among the leaves were the circular huts of the liberated Africans. The reed-thatched roofs were supported by several posts, on the inside of which were wattlings of bamboo mat; while keeskoos and pumpkins spread their leaves over the doors. Two or three negroes and their wives stood at the entrance of the enclosures, the former in straw hats and white drawers, the latter

in blue cloths, and naked from the waist upwards. "How do, daddy?"-"How do, mammy?" was answered by a bow or curtsy, and "Wery well, massa."-"Tank ye, massa." For the liberated Africans are composed of so many different tribes ignorant of each other's language, that, singularly enough, they are obliged to learn a smattering of English to communicate with each other! I went into one of the huts, and found in it a low bedplace, but no other seats than a small board raised a few inches from the ground. Mats there were to sit upon; and a few cooking-pots and baskets comprised the furniture and utensils: whilst a bamboo screen divided the hut into two apartments. Outside was a raised platform; on the top of which the family sleep, on bad musquito nights, with a fire of green twigs under them.

We rode home, and passed a stout negro in a blue pair of drawers. "I saw that man landed four years ago from a slaver," said Dr. Tibbs, "and, a few Sundays since, I observed him on his way to church, in a cocked hat, blue coat with yellow buttons, white trousers, shoes, and an umbrella under his arm, which he did not put up, as it would have concealed the view of the cocked hat. All this finery he had acquired by the produce of his field."



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

1. On coming out of my but at Fandah one morning, I saw the king seated at the gate of his prize, surrounded by his great uses, administering justice. At a little distance, on the grass, were two men and two women, who were charged with robbery. The cridence had already been gone through, before my arrival. The king was the principal speaker, and when he paused, the whole court murmaned approbation. The younger woman made a long defence, and quite astonished me by her volubility, variety of intenation, and graceful action. The appeal, however, recured to be in vain; for when she had finished, the king, who had listened with great patience, passed sentence in a speech of considerable length, delivered with great fluency and couphasis. In many parts he was much applauded, except by the poor wretches, who heard their doors with shricks of despair.

The king then retired, the court broke up, and the people dispersed. None remained but the prisoners and a decrepit old man, who, with many threats and some ceremony, administered a small bowl of poison, prepared, I believe, from the leaves of a venerable tree in the neighbourhood, which was hooped and propped all round. The poor creatures received the potion on their knees, and, before they could be induced to swallow it, east many a lingering look and last farewell on the beautiful world, from which a small draught was about to separate them. They afterwards drank a prodigious quantity of water, and when I next went out, the dose had done its deadly work. I cannot tell how far justice was truly administered, but there was a great appearance of it; and I must say that I never, in any court, saw a greater display of decorum and dignity.

2. While I was wandering one morning about the market-place at Faudah, I received a message that Innaum, the head Malem, wished to see me.

Following my guide, I entered a court-yard filled with people. On the opposite side was a square building having more pretensions to architectural design, than any I had seen. On each side of a low doorway, were placed a drawn dagger and a book. I entered, rather reluctantly, a large apartment dimly lighted and filled with people. It was divided by a wall, through which were three openings; that in the centre being an archivary ornamented with a moulding. Through one of these I was led to a venerable man, who sat alone on a white hull's hide, his elbow resting on a cushion. A single ray of light from a narrow window streamed full on his long snowy beard and white dress. All around was perfectly dark; at least to me, who had just left the light of the sun. He gave me to understand that he was the High Priest among the Mahomedans; and exprassed himself highly gentified at my visit, and with a small present which I had sent him. He gave me permission to sketch his house, and a square temple adjoining, built of mud, where some Mahomedans were vociferating their prayers. The court-yard was filled with devout loungers, who attended the Malem's levee. They treated me with great respect, though my operations excited surprise. Other courts on each side were occupied by the numerous wives, children, and slaves of the Patriarch, who did not appear to have limited himself in point of number. I saw among them some very pretty young girls, but whether they were his wives or great grand-children I could not tell. Most likely, among the many of the same age who were playing together, were some of the former, as well as his progeny of several generations.





At Rabba the king commanded his muster of the horse—the Baba-adurki—to lodge us in his quarters; which, though consisting of a great number of hots diet not afford as such elegant accommodation as might have been expected from so high a dignitary. He was, however, very civil, and his mite did the very pointe thing, by calling on us attended by her handmaistens. She reduced me, however, to a very considerable dilumina, by thronias her elf on her knees before me. As I could not call to mind that I had ever received such a mark of attention from any civilized buly of my sequinitance, for even of having read of such a precedent in any code of gallantry, I was utterly at a loss how to perform my part; whether to recent her with the dignity of an oriental, or to descend to my own marrowbones in imitation of her politeness. I steered a middle course, and rused her tenderly by the hand, whereat she and her sable and glossy nymphs laughed immoderately. She doubtless was a fascinating creature, though a little unrieldy with all Her hands and feet were deeply tinged with henna, and her lovely eyes with antimony. Her hair thickly planting with hallow and another deeply tinged with henna, and her lovely eyes with antimony. plastered with indigo -was caveluped in a sort of turban, and a country cloth encircled her waist with many graceful folds. I gratified her with a tw trilling presents—the principal object of her visit—and dismissed the rosy-footed charmer, apparently well pleased with her visit.

2. The king of Attah, or Iddah, had committed so many acts of incivility, as cutting off our provisions, poisoning some of our people, &c., that our acceptance of an invitation to visit him, may be deemed excessive rashness; especially as the queen had prepared a feast for us. We, however, site the smallest possible quantity of that of which she partook pretty freely, selecting our morsels from the immediate vicinity of where the royal huger had been plunged. There were, besides myself, Lander, Oldfield, Dean, and five Krumen; and we took care also to be well armed, on enturing the palace of the redoubted chief.


His majesty was gaily dressed for the occasion in a profusion of tobes, necklaces, &c., which must have required no small sacrifice of comfort to o tentation. His logs were encased in a pair of boots made of printed cloth, with tops like brass fenders sticking out at right angles from his shins; and his chief amusement was to make them jingle. In his lap, and suspended from his neck, was a gilt representation-or libel of the human face, very like the "man in the moon." He sat on a large cushion, at the edge of a verandah of a thatched hut. The queen sat on the ground at his right hand, and behind, in the shade of the verandah, were his wives and female slaves. Some of the courtiers were respectably dressed, while others were in rags. Our worthy old friend Abokko was obliged to prostrate himself before his brother. The thatch was adorned with some pieces of Manchester cotton. We were scated under our gay umbrella, and the king was so pleased with our visit, that we had to make several efforts before we could get away.

The last plate, lithographed by myself, is intended to give a general idea of the scenery on the banks of the Niger. The first, "Beaufort Island," is a very eligible situation for a factory. The other views shew the character of the mountains, which, above the Confluence, are all table-



He was speedily ordered out to wait till he was sent for, which had manifestly a good effect. It was a lesson which he had never before received, and which produced an equally disgusting amount of fawning humility.

'Soudan' only arrived in the afternoon, having been detained by the defective working of the engine. One of her officers, Mr. Anderson, second master, was in a very debilitated state; the consequence of a violent secondary attack of remittent fever, which had nearly carried him off, resisting almost every means used, and only yielding to large quantities of quinine, in six and eight-grain doses. That vessel was therefore ordered to repair to the bay of Amboises.

We landed in the afternoon to return King Bell's visit, and found him in front of his house, seated in a large arm-chair, with no other dress than an ample cotton cloth folded round the loins, and an English black beaver hat on. 



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

We (that is Scott and I) have decided that the N-YHS print was

made in London too, but was made after the print that the BAC owns, and without all the attributions that appear on the original. Looks like the one you have on your website is either yet another version OR (as I actually suspect) whoever took down the information mis-read the inscriptions on the one they saw in Barbados (very possible if it was hanging and under glass). It probably says what the N-YHS copy says - they read Hutte instead of Motte, and Mathias instead of Martins.

So -- if you want to see the <u>real</u> one, you'll need to take a trip to New Haven, then swing by N-YHS and see the knock-off.

Still no better idea on that slave ship image, though -- we've come up empty here (LCP). I did go to the Penn library and look through the Trans-Atlantic Slave CD but no answers there either (though I know more about the Brooks now).

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



Figure 7. Enslaved Brazilian with Face Mask, Le Magasin Pittoresque, 1846
